Our Family Engagement Philosophy


The process by which afterschool and summer programs build meaningful, impactful, lasting relationships with families to support them and their children.



- Formalized & systematized beyond you


Both: written with the Vision Statement in mind



Continuous Sustainability Efforts



Continuously evaluate throughout the process

- Ask for feedback (from families and staff)
- Evaluate feedback
- Adjust plan as necessary





Activity





Elementary School

Our program consists of 25 second graders that come from a variety of schools in District 161. This month students are learning about the solar system and how our planet fits within our galaxy. Program staff have decided to explore this subject further and allow students to learn more about this field in the OST setting.





Middle School

16 students ages ranging from 11 to 14 come to our afterschool program three days a week throughout the school year. Several students share that they participated in a career aptitude test during the school day and they are discouraged by their results- many of which do not include a four year university.





High School

A large portion of high school students in our afterschool program (about 40%) are children of immigrant families. Many of these students will be the first to apply for college and live in households that do not primarily speak English. They have expressed concerns over the application processes for college and student aid.
