Illinois' Postsecondary Attainment Goal

The Illinois P-20 Council goal is that by 2025, **60%** of all Illinois adults will have a high-quality college degree or postsecondary credential.

> Right now, Illinois is at 57.3%.

A 2023 Georgetown University Center on Education and the Workforce report notes that **70%** of jobs in Illinois will require postsecondary training in 2031.



- → Gather and curate critical data.







McMurry University 2020 SR Latino Access Score

• In fall 2020, McMurry University enrolled 214 first-time students^{*}. Since McMurry University is in Texas, we use Texas Census data from 2020 to calculate the percentage of Latino Texas Residents ages 18-24 years old.

 $\left(\frac{1300531 \text{ Latino Texas Residents ages 18- to 24-years-old in 2020}}{2804109 \text{ Texas Residents ages 18- to 24-years-old in 2020}}\right)$

= 46.37% (Latino Enrollment Benchmark)

Since we want to avoid anomalies in undergraduate enrollments, we take the average percent of Latino undergraduates at McMurry from 2019 through 2021, which is 30.48%.


 $\left(\frac{30.48\% \text{ Average Latino undergraduates } 2019-2021}{46.37\% \text{ Latino enrollment benchmark}}\right) \times 100 = 66 \text{ (D)}$

- Access Score How well the institution's undergraduate population represents that of the 18–24year-old population in the state for a specific racial or ethnic group.
- Range: 0-100+
- Grade: <60 (F), 60 to <70 (D), 70 to <80 (C), 80 to <90 (B), 90+ (A)

Access in Illinois for Black Students

- The average change in enrollment of Black students in Illinois is 2.41%
- 8 Institutions Increased enrollment
- Enrollment of Black students decreased at 4 institutions


"Segregation Forever"? Black Undergraduate Access to Public 4-year Institutions in the U.S.




Access in Illinois for Latino Students

- The average change in enrollment of Latino students in Illinois is 10.28%
- Every public Institution in Illinois Increased enrollment
- No institutions decreased enrollments of Latino students.
