

## **Rural Illinois at a Glance**



- 489 districts are small town or country
  - NCES 30s (town) and 40s (rural)
  - REAP eligible helps determine rurality
- 271 rural districts are high need
- Most attention and opportunities still go to the minority of districts
- This is why AIRSS exists

## The Association of Illinois Rural and Small Schools

- The only organization dedicated to serve as the Voice for Illinois rural and small schools
- Policy advocacy and collaborative partnerships at the local, state, and national levels
- Our work is guided by three simple values:
  - **Voice** engaged listeners and tireless advocates
  - Access networking to open spaces historically without much rural participation
  - **Leadership** enabling capacity growth













## **Rural IL CTE Survey: School Administrators**




#### Response Rate by Locale




### Southwest 56% Southeast 56% West Central 62% East Central 73% Northwest 50% Northeast 48%


#### Response Rate by REAP Eligible



Response Rate by District Type




## **Rural IL CTE Survey: School Administrators**



- 50% response rate: 237 of 468
- 91% of Rural districts offer CTE, most of which is Ag Education
- Yet, CTE is not well aligned with projected rural occupation growth
- Student interest is high, but low support & poor understanding of CTE from the government and community a challenge for growth
- Scheduling and limited workers and resources a primary issue in transportation, not necessarily distance

## **Rural IL CTE Survey: CTE Teachers**




- Lower long-term student success despite high interest and participation
- Strong course alignment to labor demands, but needs context
- Lack of instructors and program support a major barrier to program growth

## **Focus Group & Other Conversation Findings**




- CTE funding should be increased and focused on adequacy
- Regional CTE organizations are essential and critically under-supported
- Stereotypes about CTE are rampant and damaging
- Coordination for dual credit is weak
- CTE courses have issues:
  - $\circ~$  Low focus on lower grades
  - $\circ~$  Barriers to collaboration
  - CTE segregation
- Despite shallowers are are are atrane

## **Rural CTE Advisory Council Meetings**



Outcomes

& Retention



### ➤ State Level

- Low financial support despite economic and social importance and impact of CTE, and verbal commitments to support CTE
- Low coordination among parallel state efforts (dual credit especially)

### Community/Regional Level

- Poor networking between schools and workforce
- Low capacity of regional organizations to help rural districts

### > School Level

- Difficulties collaborating with each other
- Poor networking with workforce partners
- Weak alignment to major rural economic drivers
- All around poor understanding and awareness of CTE

## **Action Areas**

State	<ul> <li>→ Advocate for making CTE a required part of every student's learning, not just an elective</li> <li>→ Advocate for more robust funding of local and regional CTE efforts</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>→ Foster more cross-agency, cross-department collaborations</li> <li>→ Bring schools and community colleges to the table together</li> </ul>
Community /Regional	<ul> <li>→ Explore and institute clearer regulations for allowing high school interns</li> <li>→ Cultivate a practice of including school representatives at strategic employment meetings</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>→ Attend your local Education for Employment Regional Delivery System meetings</li> <li>→ Consider how your staff and facilities could support the education process</li> </ul>
School	<ul> <li>→ Incorporate more core curriculum material in CTE courses so they count toward graduation credit</li> <li>→ Adopt a more flexible bell schedule to allow for easier travel to CTE learning opportunities</li> <li>→ Create a CTE advisory council of workforce and community partners</li> <li>→ Extend the PaCE Framework to Kindergarten</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>→ Adopt a more flexible and collaborative approach toward working with other districts in support of student success</li> <li>→ Consider co-teaching models or opportunities with workforce partners</li> <li>→ Partner with your local workforce innovation board to align CTE programming to employment needs and connect students with assistance</li> <li>→ Invest in the school itself as a site for work-based learning in all fields</li> </ul>
