
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


Of the 10 largest U.S. cities Philadelphia has the highest rate of deep poverty.

High School Graduation Rates












In the years since the Great Recession, the jobless level in Philadelphia has declined more slowly than in some comparable cities.


The **education and medical sectors** account for more than 30% of all jobs.

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STRATEGIES

- 2. Support a stronger fit between available services and supports for youth.
- 3. Increase and improve connections between re-engagement and post-secondary opportunities for disconnected and re-engaged youth.





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


