ELIMINATING EQUITY GAPS ON THE ROAD TO 60% BY 2025

As a state, we have been working toward the goal of 60% of Illinois adults earning a high-quality postsecondary degree or credential by 2025 to ensure our workforce is skilled and prepared to meet the needs of tomorrow. However, we also know that averages never tell the whole story – in fact, current levels of postsecondary attainment vary widely across socioeconomic and racial groups. Learn about work to update the State's 60% by 2025 goal to address these equity gaps, as well as how a cohort of postsecondary institutions in the Partnership for College Completion's Illinois Equity in Attainment (ILEA) initiative are transforming their efforts to close gaps for their students.

Dual Credit & College & Career Pathway **Endorsements**

College and Career Pathway Endorsements (CCPE) aimed at bridging the gap between high school and college can be a game-changer for students. High schoolers can earn endorsements on their diploma by completing career focused course sequences and engaging in hands-on professional learning. At this session, attendees will learn how to assess feasibility for early college expansion, identify early college courses that can be foundational to pathways or 2+2 programs, and leverage strategic awarding of early college credit to make these opportunities even more valuable to students.

Using Data to Tell Our Stories & Inform Our Decisions

We know that using data is an essential practice for ensuring our work is addressing the challenges facing our communities, but we are often overwhelmed by all the numbers - what should we look at, and how should we make sense of it all? This workshop will provide attendees tools to both figure out what data can help answer the questions they have about their community or work, as well as what to do with the information once they obtain it. Attendees will both learn about data resources available to them and also practice using easy-to-use data protocols that can inform their collective impact efforts.

Lessons from Thrive Chicago & My Brother's Keeper

Words frame our world and the messages we develop can be monumental or detrimental. As practitioners, we are often tasked with telling the story of the communities we serve and use narratives to secure funding, gain publicity, communicate challenges and progress, and obtain public support. Asset framing enables us to develop and use narratives that define communities by their aspirations, rather than the challenges they experience. In this workshop, participants will explore: the psychological and cultural power of narrative, why deficit framing sabotages equity, and how we can begin shifting conversations about the people we serve. Thrive Chicago will also highlight the My Brother's Keeper initiative that focuses on increasing opportunities for Black and Latino young men in the city of Chicago through a collective impact, asset-based approach.

Participants will engage directly with CDE Toolkit resources and map out how they might develop new practices or enhance current programs to provide work-based learning experiences that help the youth they work with explore careers and develop valuable skills.

High school students dive in as early as freshman year and over time have the opportunity to teach, receive early college credit and professional development, and potentially work in local schools after college graduation.
